Half Term 1

Science	- Students will study Forces, where they will look at what forces can do to an object and understand how forces can be balanced or unbalanced. - The next topic they study is structure and function of body systems where they will learn about specific systems in the human body like the skeleton. - Before christmas Year 7 students will look at atoms, elements and compounds in Chemistry. RE	- Year 7 students will focus on the Bible as the Christian holy book. - They will learn how the Bible is organised, explore the difference between the Old and New Testaments, and examine how Catholics understand revelation. - Students will consider different types of writing found in scripture, investigate how the Bible is used in worship and everyday life, and learn about the role of the Magisterium in interpreting scripture. - Towards the end of the unit, they will also be introduced to other sacred texts, including the Qur'an and the Torah, encouraging an understanding of different religious traditions.	- They will learn how the Bible is organised, explore the difference between the Old and New Testaments, and examine how Catholics understand revelation. - Students will consider different types of writing found in scripture, investigate how the Bible is used in worship and everyday life, and learn about the role of the Magisterium in interpreting scripture.
